# 40 years of one of the greatest safety devices ever created - the seat belt

#### 25th Jan 2023

Controversy was stirred recently when UK Prime Minister Rishi Sunak appeared in a video, posted on social media, where he was seen in the back seat of a moving vehicle without his seat belt fastened. Car occupants have been legally required to wear a seat belt in a moving vehicle for 40 years. The seat belt was originally invented in Sweden and first adopted by Volvo. The invention's proven track record of saving lives has led to it becoming as familiar and ubiquitous as the steering wheel.

## IAM RoadSmart's policy on seat belt use is straightforward...

Seat belts have saved countless lives – plausibly numbering in the millions – since their introduction. The risk of death or severe injury in a collision increases dramatically for anyone not wearing their seat belt. That's why it's critical for drivers and passengers alike to

ensure that their seat belts are fastened.

As we all know, nobody is exempt from the danger that is present when driving or travelling as a passenger in a moving vehicle. The Prime Minister has reportedly been issued a conditional offer of a fixed penalty for the offence. This will cost him £100, which could increase up to £500 if the matter ends up going to court.

## What are the statistics on people wearing seat belts?

In 2021, of all car occupant fatalities, 34% of males and 20% of females were not wearing seat belts. 17-29-year-olds were the worst offenders with 40% of fatalities not wearing a seat belt. Of all fatalities that occurred between 6pm and 8am, 47% were not wearing a seat belt.

When we compare these figures to the far smaller portion of car occupants who are observed not wearing seat belts (usually between 10% and 5%), it becomes clear how real the danger is of travelling without a seat belt, in the event of a collision, and is an issue we must all take seriously.

#### Cat hit-and-runs must stop, warns road safety charity

#### 31st Jan 2023

Feline hit-and-runs could soon become a thing of the past if a new law were to be introduced, says the UK's leading road safety charity, IAM RoadSmart. The new law would mandate motorists that run over a cat on Britain's roads to stop, report the incident to the police and seek help from a vet. Currently, under the Road Traffic Act (1988), drivers are required to report collisions involving animals such as dogs, horses, pigs and sheep. Cats are not protected under the same regulations, and collisions do not need to be reported. IAM RoadSmart supports parity of treatment for cats, by ensuring that they are also recognised under legislation.

IAM RoadSmart's plea comes in the wake of MPs also speaking in support of the appeal at a Petitions Committee debate on 9 January, which was prompted after an e-petition amassed 102,436 signatures.


